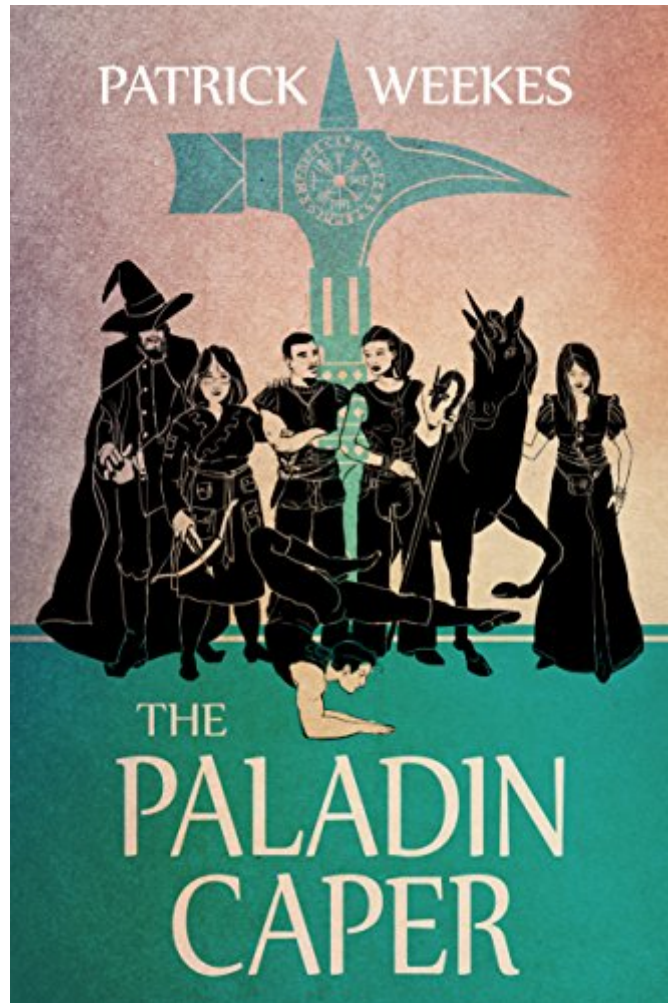


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The Paladin Caper (Rogues Of The Republic Book 3)

The three books in the Rogues of the Republic trilogy are so much fun. I like to say it's Ocean's Eleven meets The Wizard of Oz, because that's something most people get quickly. To me, though,

it's more like the two TV shows *Leverage* and *Firefly*. I think it's because I enjoy the characters themselves so much, and the chemistry of the team, that it reminds me of *Firefly*. And Loch is so clever, always with a surprise, that it's a bit like *Leverage*. Loch would rather outsmart you than fight, but if it's a fight you want, she's down with that, too. Anyway, if you like fantasy novels that twist the genre in amusing and clever ways, while still hewing to fundamental "rules", you'll really enjoy these books. (Sorry for the cryptic headline. Took me a while to get into this one, in fact I had to put it aside and come back to it some months later as I was not in the right headspace. Was a much slower start than the previous books. Once I did get into it, I enjoyed this just as much as the other ones. Great action, banter, impossible challenges and creative ways of attempting to overcome them. I liked how we got more of a look at the back story of the main characters here. I enjoyed the explanations at the end of how some of the unexpected twists eventually came about, it made it more believable that some things could be planned in advance rather than change their tune at a critical moment for no obvious reason. It felt like the last in the series which was a shame as these have been very enjoyable to read. I hope the author writes more stories.

Is this the end of the series? Was this a trilogy? Something about this book makes me think that, and I'm okay with it because almost everything feels resolved. Not just resolved, but resolved in a satisfying way. I love when that happens because it so rarely seems to, but by the end of this book, I was feeling pleased. It's hard to say much about this book and its characters that I haven't already said. I love the ever present humour, especially Kail's "œyour mother" jokes, those never get old. I also love how we get to meet Kail's mom, and learn Icy's back story, both of which were not quite what I expected. This is the type of book, and series, that is all about enjoyment, and I certainly enjoyed it. This is a light-hearted humour-filled fantasy adventure, and it's so easy to read. I'd suggest it to anyone looking for a giggle, although the books definitely need to be read in order.

Every time I start one of Weekes' books, I wonder if he's going to pull it off again. So far, he has every time. The Rogues are a diverse set of characters, each endearing in their own way. Multiple plot lines are handled deftly. Lots of twists and turns lead to a satisfying conclusion. I once thought the Rogues would be a typical team with a quest book, but it is, delightfully, much more.

...but rarely is there both. Unless you read the Rogues of the Republic trilogy by Patrick Weekes. It's Oceans 11 in a fantasy setting. Non-stop, witty dialogue. A whole host of colorful characters. A horny unicorn. (See what I did there?) A talking war hammer that only knows three phrases. A magician that was kicked out of magic school. A strong, black, female lead who is hot AND kicks butt. Awesome fight scenes. Surprises. Long cons. Twists. Turns. Red herrings. In you end oh. Oh. Ya. Fun. And funny. All three books are outstanding fun, but the third one is really something special. Highly recommend. Watch out for some mild sex jokes and innuendo. Book three has a homosexual relationship.
